As if *Swan* could get more popular, the Design District eatery recently introduced a new weekend brunch. Available both Saturday and Sunday from 11AM to 3PM, the a la carte menu features standouts such as shrimp and grits, bourbon cinnamon roll, coconut pancakes, ham and cheese omelet and the smoked salmon tier, a tea party of sorts with toasted bagels, lox, deviled eggs and tomatoes. Azabu Miami Beach

The Bazaar by José Andrés H

With an eclectic decor courtesy of Philippe Starck, The Bazaar is as much about seeing as about being seen. Casa Tua H This hidden enclave seems more like a beautiful Italian villa than a restaurant, and the intimate setting is ideal for its exquisite Mediterranean dinners.
